Model and extend language as they		
complete puzzles, games, and look closely		
at books together?		
Encourage all children to participate with		
stories as much as possible?		
Provide varied opportunities for the		
youngest children to explore sound making		
with everyday objects and instruments?		
Play games which encourage children to		
listen, match and remember?		
Model and extend the language for		
comparing sounds?		
Teach the children a new song every week		
which the children learn to sing from		
memory?		
Introduce every day and musical sounds in		
a clear progression, beginning with very		
different sounds, becoming progressively		
similar over time?		
Teach children a progression of age-		
appropriate rhymes that they learn from		
memory?		
Model speech sounds clearly?		
Encourage children to clap a steady beat		
when they sing?		
Include simple clapping games with		
growing complexity?		
Encourage preschool children to fill in the		
rhyming gaps in known stories?		
Play rhyming games with preschoolers,		
modelling and expecting an accurate		
explanation that "words rhyme when the		
ends of words sound the same and the		
beginnings sound different?"		
Play alliteration games with preschoolers,		
modelling that the children are listening out		
for "the same sounds at the beginning of		
words"?		
Model saying spoken sounds accurately?		
Play oral blending and segmenting games		
with preschoolers?		
Incorporate oral blending and segmenting		
into daily preschool routines and play		
enhancements?		
Regularly check prephonic progress to		
ensure that all children are on track,		
planning appropriately to ensure that any		
learning gaps are addressed?
