

Communication and Language Top Tips: Fewer Questions, More Comments

One of the easiest things you can do to help develop your child's language is to talk about your day together.



Focus on activities that your child enjoys, and you can do together.

Fewer questions:



- Talk about your day.
 - Describe what you're doing.
- Doing this helps children enjoy chatting without the pressure of lots of questions.

More comments:



- Repeat: what your child says.
- Expand: Add a new word.
- Explain: What they can see, hear, and feel.

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Did you know...

- Children gain more words by listening to you comment on what they are doing than being asked questions.
- When commenting, you give children new words.
- When asking questions, children need to have the words to answer.
- Sometimes we might not get a response to the question we have asked; there may be a few reasons for this:
 - Children may struggle to answer questions if they do not have the words to answer.
 - Children need time to process questions and formulate an answer.

Remember...



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Describe:



- Comment on what your child does during everyday routines.
- When washing hands, use words such as 'rub', 'splash', 'clean'. This helps them learn new words.
