

Current alert level in Bolton: NATIONAL RESTRICTIONS

Estimated R number for the North West:

0.7-0.9 with a daily infection growth rate of -6% to -4% as of 5th March 2021

People tested positive in Bolton

Latest data provided on 8th March 2021, for the 7 day period to 3rd March 2021

Average number per day (last 7 days) 46

Rate per 100k, all ages: **110.9** (\downarrow on previous 7 days)

Rate per 100k, age 60+: **70.7** (\downarrow on previous 7 days)




Bolton cases by specimen date




Age specific case rates

Public Health Update: Key messages 1/2

Trends in positive case rates:

- Rates remain high. Although they are trending downwards, this is from a high position
- Majority of cases (over three quarters) are in the working age population
- Case rates are trending down more slowly in Bolton's working age population
- Downward trend is slower than average in Bolton
- Case rates for small areas are volatile and need careful investigation/interpretation
- Reductions in case rates in the main are being driven by current national restrictions (Stay at Home) at the present time

Learning from outbreak management and situation review (all settings):

- Some excellent practice, 'soft' intelligence
- Minimise number of contacts as far as possible
- Breaktimes, car sharing

Public Health Update: Key messages 2/2

Control measures are the same, whatever the variant Hands – Face – Space – Ventilate

Note on vaccination:

- Primary focus is reducing serious illness and deaths
- Phased roll out determined by national expert committee
- Effective at preventing serious disease
- Likely that will help reduce transmission, but we'll learn more about this over time
- Existing vaccines are standing up well to new variants



Vaccination Programme

- Strict regulations set by the Joint Committee on Vaccination & Immunisation (JCVI)
- Vaccinations issued in line with Standard Operating Procedures (SOP)
- Focus is to protect those most likely to suffer mortality as a result of the virus
- To date, programme focused on the health and social care working with clinically extremely vulnerable people, alongside GP led vaccinations based on age and health conditions (priority groups)


Testing for Childminders and Standalone OOSC

- Currently exploring suitable options for asymptomatic testing guidelines are changing every few days
- Government said they are continuing to work closely with colleagues across government and local
 authorities to secure the most effective approach to asymptomatic testing for childminders.
 Childminders should continue to access community testing facilities for asymptomatic testing.
- Looking at expanding the Community testing and scoping the use of some Start well centres with opening hours to meet the needs of Childminders and OOSC
- Looking to provide central resources when national guidance is clear

Asymptomatic testing programme

- The asymptomatic testing programme in education will expand to all staff in private, voluntary and independent nurseries, who will start to receive deliveries of Lateral Flow Devices (LFDs). Staff will be asked to take their test kits home and carry out the test twice a week. The LFD test will give a result in around 30 minutes. Staff who test positive will then self-isolate, helping to reduce transmission of the virus.
- This will help to break the chains of transmission of coronavirus in education settings by identifying asymptomatic positive cases. This is important as up to one in three people who have the virus have it without symptoms (they are asymptomatic) so could be spreading the disease unknowingly.
- The Department will be in touch shortly to provide you with further guidance for the use of the LFD home testing kits, which will also include information about **upcoming webinars**.




PHE Psychological First Aid for Children: E-Learning Package

National Road Map Bolton Communications Plan

- Adopted a 'whole system' plan / approach across Council, FT, CCG, GMP and Voluntary Sector Council represents schools and early years. The Cabinet Office are also part of this Comms Cell
- Dynamic Communications Plan will continue to develop alongside the national road map / messaging / testing
- There will be things we ask schools / settings to share but also need feedback re needs / what messaging is and is not
 working on the ground
- FAQs are on the Bolton Council website will include national information for parents
- Anniversary of first case in Bolton was this week will be some activity to mark the last 12 months whilst reinforcing messages of hope



Holiday Activities and Food Programme

- Government programme being coordinated by the local authority
- Bringing together holiday activity with food element embedded
- Targeted activity for school aged children who qualify for FSM, or are vulnerable
- Working up a skeleton programme for Easter, will be a broader programme for summer
- Will be reaching out to schools to help identify and target promotion to pupils
- Opportunities for partners to deliver activities in summer if interested
